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

Students who are unsupervised by an adult are not allowed on campus until 7:50 AM. Staff members are not on duty to supervise students until 7:50 AM.

Afternoon Dismissal/Checkout


Students will be dismissed at 3:20 PM. Walkers will be dismissed prior to dismissing car riders for safety measures. Students must be picked up by 3:40 PM. Students picked up after 3:40 PM will need to sign-out students in the office. Students picked up after 3:40 PM on a consistent basis will need to meet with an administrator.

Student Checkout: Students will only be released to individuals listed on the student's emergency card (must present a photo ID). The parent/guardian who completes the emergency card will be the only individual authorized to make changes to the emergency card. No early dismissals after 2:45 PM.

Attendance

Daily attendance is the expectation for all students, except when there is illness, injury, or serious situations that will affect attendance. Students will be recognized during each grading period for perfect attendance (no late arrivals / early dismissals).



Each homeroom teacher will select a "Student of the Week" based on students' leadership skills, Wildly Important Goals progress, academics, attendance, and/or behavior.

- Morning Announcement Highlights
- Line Leader for the Day (Monday & Friday)
- Lunch with Administrators (Days may vary during the week. Lunch will be on the stage.)

Response to Intervention (Rtl)

The Response to Intervention (RtI) is a federally-mandated process that is designed to evaluate student progress and to plan alternative instructional interventions as needed. Through the RtI process, school staff members work with parents in order to develop appropriate learning strategies. Parents are invited to each RtI meeting to help with identifying appropriate learning strategies for students to be successful during the learning process.

Homework

Each student needs to be successful during the school year. Homework allows students to build confidence as they practice and extend their learning outside the classroom. It is vital for students to complete homework assignments each day. The following is list of additional daily activities to increase student achievement:

- Read with an adult at least 10 minutes and discuss text.
- Read to build fluency.
- Create and write stories.
- Practice letter sounds and sight words.
- Practice math facts (addition, subtraction, multiplication, division) to build math fluency.
- Practice handwriting .

Signed Papers

Signed papers and school information will be sent home on Wednesdays with students. Please review your child's class assignment with your child.

Signed papers should be returned on Thursday with parents/guardians' signature. If you would like to discuss your child's signed papers, please schedule a meeting with your child's teacher. If you would like to keep your child's signed papers beyond Friday, please write a note to the teacher. If signed papers are not returned by the following Wednesday, no additional papers will be sent home until the that set is returned.

Union Elementary School AR Program Plan 2022-23



Reading is out of this world! Blast off with a great book!

- The AR program is divided into 6 marking periods. (Dates to be determined by the district.)
- Students will take the STAR test to determine their individualized reading level, and teachers (or Mrs. Wildman???) will set an appropriate (challenging yet attainable) goal for their students based on 30 minutes of reading per day.
- Students will be expected to check out at least one library book on their reading level each week. They can take tests to earn points on books they have read from the library, from home, or online.
- Each marking period we will hold a fun celebration for students who make their goals AND maintain a minimum average of 85% (80% for students who are PEC for reading and for ESOL students).
 - Celebration themes for the year will be:
 - 1. BLAST OFF with a great book! (Rocket Theme)
 - "Plan-It" Party -Plan It-As in "Begin with the end in mind" and plan to make your AR goal. (Planet Theme)
 - 3. Astronaut Training and Adventure -Books teach you <u>new</u> things and take you to places you've never been. (Astronaut Theme)
 - 4. I'm a STAR Reader!
 - 5. Shoot for the MOON, read lots of books!
 - 6. Reading Makes You So Bright! (Sun Theme).
 - 7. For students who have made all six goals, a fun mystery event will be held at the end of the year.
- Each class will be provided with a goal clip chart to hang outside of their rooms to help keep students motivated.
- Mrs. Wildman will work with teachers to recognize an AR Student of the Week from
 each class to receive a book from the vending machine. This is a progress award.
 Teachers should select students who are making great strides in reading. It does not
 have to be the student with the highest average, the highest word count, the most
 books. It can be any student who is working diligently and giving their best effort toward
 reaching their AR goals. I do not want AR to be a competition between students or
 classes but rather a tool to have students working to improve their reading and feeling
 successful with the strides they are making.
- Weekly Word Count recognition will take place on Friday morning announcements. Students will have their picture on the announcements for moving up to the next level, and the top 10 students in the school will be recognized. K-2nd students will be

recognized for each 10,000 words they read. Grades 3-5 will be recognized starting at 50,000 words. In keeping with the Leader in Me, there will also be a Word Count Scoreboard outside of the media center recognizing students who are moving up in word count. One will be for K-2 and the other for grades 3-5.

- Students who have met their goal for the marking period will also be recognized on the morning announcements on Friday mornings.
- Our goal is to have at least 3 "millionaire readers" at the end of the year. Millionaire
 readers will earn a special t-shirt and lunch with a buddy in the library. Mrs. Wildman
 will order the millionaire reader a special lunch, and their buddy can bring their school
 or sack lunch to eat with them in the library.
- Medals will be given at the end of the year Awards Ceremony to recognize the following achievements

1st Grade - Read and tested on 45 Books or more

2nd Grade- Read and tested on 55 Books or more

3rd Grade 65 books or more with at least 5 books worth 1 point or more;

4th grade 65 books or more with at least 10 books worth 1 point or more;

5th grade 75 books or more with at least 15 books worth 1 or more points

 Certificates will be awarded to students at the end of the year Awards Ceremony for the highest level of achievement they achieve during the year. Each child will receive one certificate. The levels are as follows.

Ready Reader

Accumulate 5 points on books read To, read With, and/or read Independently.

Independent Reader-Read at least 3 books independently with a 1.2 or higher ATOS book level (or 160L Lexile[®] Measure) and earn 10 points. Only books read independently count toward the 3-book goal, but books read To, With, or Independently count toward the points. Do not recertify at this level

Rising Reader-Read 3 books independently with a 1.6 or higher ATOS book level (or 250L Lexile[®] Measure) and earn 10 points from books at or above that book level. Only books read independently count toward the 3-book goal and points. Recertifies 5 times

Super Reader-Read 3 books independently with a 2.0 or higher ATOS book level (or 330L Lexile[®] Measure) that are each worth at least 1 point. Only books read independently count toward the 3-book goal and points. Recertifies 5 times

Awards / Student Recognitions

End of the Year honors will be given to students who show exemplary character and academic achievement. The awards will be the following categories:

- Principal's Honor Roll Must maintain all A's on progress report and report cards all year.
- A/B Honor Roll Must have all A's and B's on progress report and report cards all year.
- Superintendent's Perfect Attendance No absences, no early dismissals, or tardies all year.
- Principal's Outstanding Attendance No absences, but may have an early dismissal or tardy
- Citizenship Must demonstrate strength of character and follow the PBIS-LIM expectations at all times. No office or bus referrals.
- Most Improved (Behavior and academic) Selected by homeroom teacher.
- Highest Grade Average in Reading, English, Math, Science, and Social Studies – One Student per category from each grade level (Math and ELA only in grades 1 and 2).
- Most AR Points One student per grade level who earns the most Accelerated Reader points.
- Greatest Lexile Gain
 One student per grade level who earns the greatest
 Lexile Gains on the end-of-year STAR Assessment.
- Highest Lexile Score
 One student per grade level who earns the highest Lexile score on the end-of-year STAR Assessment.
- *Highest I-Ready Score* One student per grade level who earns the highest I-Ready Math score or average on the end-of-year STAR Assessment.

Students will also be recognized for their participation in clubs and other school activities $\ensuremath{^{}}$

Fees, Fines, & Charges

The Bibb County School District provides a free education to all Bibb County students. Schools provide textbooks and instructional materials to all students. Parents are responsible for all textbooks and instructional materials assigned to their child(ren).

Parents shall pay for all items not returned or returned with excessive wear and tear. Parents may contact their child's teacher or the school office for fee amounts to damaged or lost assigned items.

Health & Safety

The health and safety of all students are important to the safety of others. If your child has a fever, please keep them at home. If your child develops a fever at school, parents will be contacted and students must be picked up.

Students must remain out of school until they have been fever-free foe 24 hours without medicine.

Registration

Registering New Students for School

Parents can now register **new students** to Bibb County Schools with the new **Online Registration application**.

Pre-K families, DO NOT fill out this form unless your child has already been selected for the <u>Pre-K program</u> through the lottery process.

The following required documents listed below may be uploaded during online registration process.

- 1. A certified birth certificate
- 2. Student Social Security card
- 3. Immunization Record on GA Form 3231
- 4. Hearing, Vision, Dental Screening on GA Form 3300
- 5. A government issued picture identification for the parent or guardian
- 6. Two documents validating proof of residence, which may include:
- Lease or Mortgage Required
- Plus one of the following:
- Current utility bill (electric, water, or gas)
- Most recent income tax return
- Property tax statement
- Automobile registration or insurance
- Mail from any government agency
- Last report card and/or transcript (if applicable)

If the Proof of Residence is not in the legal guardian's name, a Residential Affidavit must be obtained from the school prior to enrolling the student. Both the parent and the person they will live with will need to complete the Residential Affidavit at the school the student will be attending. Please contact the individual school to set up an appointment for this process to be completed. Please bring the Proof of Residence and a valid picture ID with you.

Student Transfers

Internal - If you are transferring from one school in BCSD to another school in BCSD, please utilize Parent Portal to access our Online Registration platform. When you enter your new address and provide supporting proof of residence, you can contact the new school to complete the transfer process.

External - If you are transferring from a school outside of BCSD, please go to our information for enrolling a new student through our Online Registration system.

Student Withdrawals

Please contact the office and inform us of your intent to withdraw, your reason for withdrawal, and to determine what additional steps may be required in order to clear records and request that records be sent to your new school.

Weapons Message

ELEMENTARY MESSAGE:

Students this is a reminder that we want to keep our school safe and secure. Our school district will not tolerate weapons in school, and this includes toys like BB guns and throwing stars. Even elementary school students who bring these items to school could be expelled. If you see another student with any of these items, you should report it to a teacher or administrator immediately. COVID Update

DISTRICT SAFETY PROTOCOLS

- · Masks are optional in schools, BCSD buildings and on school buses.
- Masks are <u>still required</u> for those individuals returning to school or work during the isolation phase.
- COVID-19 vaccinations and/or boosters are not required but are strongly recommended and encouraged for any eligible individual. Find a vaccination site at <u>www.vaccines.gov</u>. Learn more about pediatric COVID-19 vaccine recommendations at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019ncov/vaccines/recommendations/children-teens.html</u>.
- Individuals should remain home if they feel unwell and contact their medical provider if they are experiencing any symptoms of COVID-19.

Student/Staff Isolation: Anyone who tests positive for COVID-19 (regardless of vaccination status) must:

- Isolate at home for 5 days from the date symptoms first appeared or, if asymptomatic, the date
 of the positive test. Stay away from others in the household as much as possible during
 isolation.
- After 5 days, if you have no symptoms or your symptoms are resolving and you have not had
 fever for more than 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication, you may end
 isolation. If symptoms are not improving or fever has not resolved, you should continue isolating
 for the remainder of the 10 days or until these criteria are met within the 10-day timeframe.
- After ending isolation, you should continue to wear a mask around other individuals in the home and in public for 5 days or the conclusion of the 10-day timeframe.
- · Should fever persist beyond 10 days, a doctor's note may be required.

Appendix

COVID Update (continued)

Student Quarantine: If a student has been identified as a close contact to someone with COVID-19 outside of the school setting, follow these protocols.

Vaccinated and/or boosted:

Depending on <u>eligibility</u> by age, if you have been fully vaccinated or boosted within the last 6 months (Moderna or Pfizer vaccine) or within the last 2 months (J&J vaccine):

- · You do not need to quarantine.
- · You should wear a mask around other individuals in public for 10 days.
- If possible, get tested on day 5.
- If you develop symptoms, get tested and isolate at home until test results are received, then
 proceed in accordance with the test results.
- · A school nurse may ask for proof of vaccination.

Unvaccinated:

If you are unvaccinated, or became fully vaccinated more than 6 months ago (Moderna or Pfizer vaccine) or more than 2 months ago (J&J vaccine) and have not received a booster <u>depending on</u> <u>eligibility by age</u>:

- You must quarantine at home for 5 days. After that, continue to wear a mask around other individuals for 5 additional days.
- · If possible, get tested on day 5.
- If you develop symptoms, get tested and isolate at home until test results are received, then
 proceed in accordance with the test results.
- NOTE: When the close contact is a household member and is unable to quarantine away from
 the positive individual, the quarantine period does not start until the isolation of the positive
 person is finished. In other words, the quarantine will be 10-20 days based on whether the
 positive individual and the close contact are symptomatic or asymptomatic. This is most
 common when the positive person is a parent, and the close contact is a young child. A school
 nurse may help clarify these guidelines for staff.
- Per an <u>Administrative Order</u>, schools may adhere to different quarantine requirements in order to facilitate in-person learning. These alternative quarantine guidelines can only be followed if the point of exposure is in the school setting and the individual remains symptom-free during the quarantine period.

VISITORS

 Upon entering buildings and signing in through CheckMate, volunteers and guests will be required to respond to COVID-19 safety questions before completing the check-in process.
